Second annual RCA Texas Dinner boasts a keynote speech by public safety wireless telecommunications consultant Craig M. Jorgensen

Texas Dinner in Galveston, Craig M. Jorgensen will deliver the keynote speech.

Jorgensen is project director and co-chair of APCO Project 25 – 34, chair of the Project MESA Steering Committee, and a member of the boards of directors of the Radio Club of America and the Public Safety Spectrum Trust (PSST). Long associated with standards development for digital radio communications, Jorgensen is a past president of the Associated Public-Safety Communications Officials International (APCO) and the National Association of State Telecommunications Directors (NASTD).

“Digital technology is a major change from the analog systems that we’ve used for the past 50 to 60 years,” Jorgensen said. “There needs to be a concerted effort to help people recognize that public safety systems are needed and we, as a society, have an obligation to fund and maintain those critical systems and services. Conversely, public safety communications managers have an obligation to seek out greater cooperation between all levels of government and the private sector in an effort to acquire the most efficient and cost effective solutions available.”

The RCA Texas Dinner will be held in conjunction with a training conference and exhibition sponsored by Texas APCO, a chapter of APCO. The RCA function begins with a social hour and cash bar at 6 p.m. in Ballroom A in the Galveston Island Convention Center at 5600 Seawall Blvd., Galveston, Tex. Dinner begins at 7 p.m. The RCA Texas Dinner is open to members, guests and visitors. Advance registration at \$50 per person is required. No on-site registration will be available.
